First Reading: Ezekiel 34:11-16, 20-24

Because Israel's kings proved to be bad shepherds, Ezekiel declares that the LORD will assume the role of shepherd in Israel. The LORD will also set over them a shepherd-messiah, "my servant David," who will feed and care for the people. ¹¹Thus says the Lord God: I myself will search for my sheep, and will seek them out. ¹²As shepherds seek out their flocks

when they are among their scattered sheep, so I will seek out my sheep. I will rescue them from all the places to which they have been scattered on a day of clouds and thick darkness. ¹³I will bring them out from the peoples and gather them from the countries, and will bring them into their own land; and I will feed them on the mountains of Israel, by the watercourses, and in all the inhabited parts of the land. ¹⁴I will feed them with good pasture, and the mountain heights of Israel shall be their pasture; there they shall lie down in good grazing land, and they shall feed on rich pasture on the mountains of Israel. ¹⁵I myself will be the shepherd of my sheep, and I will make them lie down, says the Lord God. ¹⁶I will seek the lost, and I will bring back the strayed, and I will bind up the injured, and I will strengthen the weak, but the fat and the strong I will destroy. I will feed them with justice.

²⁰Therefore, thus says the Lord God to them: I myself will judge between the fat sheep and the lean sheep. ²¹Because you pushed with flank and shoulder, and butted at all the weak animals with your horns until you scattered them far and wide, ²²I will save

Holy Gospel: Matthew 25:31-46

Jesus compares himself to a king who moves among his subjects to see how he is treated: what is done for the least of those who belong to his family is truly done for him.

January Moringe Sokoine Secondary School; Monduli, Tanzania

The school in Monduli has been a mission project for PLC for several years. PLC has provided funding to assist with various needs at the school.

February Prince of Wales Island Ministry, POW, AK

This is a new ministry within the Southeast Cluster of the Alaska Synod. Services will be offered each month, beginning in January 2018, in the hope of forming a new ELCA congregation on the island.

March Glacier Bible Camp; Juneau, AK

The Southeast Cluster of the AK Synod hosts a church camp each summer. This funding helps to pay expenses which camper fees do not fully cover.

April Pacific Lutheran University; Tacoma, WA

PLU is a small private liberal arts university founded by Norwegian Lutherans. Our donation allows PLC confirmands who attend the university to obtain a scholarship of \$1000 per year.

May Special Fund for Local Needs; Petersburg, AK

This fund is used to assist local residents with special needs. These are generally one-time or emergency appeals.

June Good Beginnings Preschool; Petersburg, AK

The preschool is a long-term mission of PLC, housed in the Rebbi Hus. It provides quality education for preschoolers.

July Lutheran Disaster Response

This mission of the ELCA “brings God’s hope, healing and renewal to people whose lives have been disrupted by disasters.” The funds are used throughout the world.

August Kuwaa Mission Project, Liberia

The project assists the Kuwaa peoples to “rebuild and restore their lives”. They work to provide safe drinking water and to sanitary conditions in the area, to rebuild the schools, churches, and medical clinics, and assist with other needs.

September Prisoners for Christ; Woodinville, WA
Prisoners for Christ is a ministry to adults and juveniles in jails and prisons. They provide church services, Bibles studies and classes, concerts, and mentoring. Their outreach extends throughout the Pacific Northwest, across the United States, and around the world.

October Petersburg Mental Health; Petersburg, AK
This non-profit organization within our community provides professional behavioral health services.

November “Crocheting Their Way” Ministry; Wildwood Women’s Prison, Kenai, AK
This is an ecumenical project of volunteers trained by the Kairos Prison Ministries of Alaska. Items crocheted by the inmates are distributed to various charitable organizations around the state.

December Lutheran World Relief *This mission of the ELCA provides assistance to families throughout the world in via disaster relief and recovery and sustainable development projects. The Ruth Circle at PLC makes quilts for distribution by LWR; knitted baby afghans are also sent from Petersburg.*

GOSPEL MESSAGE

November 22, 2020

CHRIST THE KING

Action and Reflection

The story of the sheep and the goats in Matthew 25 begins with the Son of Man on a throne. It is an image of a king sitting in judgment. In any era of human history, this image of an all-powerful ruler sitting in judgement would be consistent with our images of power and authority. What follows runs against all of our expectations. The king connects his presence to the people who are poor and oppressed. This does not fit our human practices of power. Even a benevolent leader is not seen in the presence of the least among us.

Though Jesus makes this connection, it is easy to read this story and get hooked into the power dynamics of judgment. We may wonder if we are a sheep or a goat and think about this status in an eternal sense as it relates to our relationship with God. This heavy reflection may lead us to think we might somehow have to earn our way into God's grace.

The theology of the cross finds Jesus exercising his kingship through the weakness of the cross. From the resurrection that follows this death, we receive the gift of life. This gift comes with the freedom to leave aside worries about eternity in favor of attending to faithful living today. If Jesus frees us from concern about our relationship with God, the story of the sheep and the goats becomes more of a checklist for grace-filled living than a scorecard for eternity. It becomes an invitation and a guide rather than an indictment.

Included in this invitation is an opportunity for reflection. Neither the sheep nor the goats realize how their actions have or have not been faithful. In this way the story gives us a simple gift by which to measure our path in faith and reflect on the ways we spend our days.
