#### From the Pastor:

#### November Days: An Ending and Just the Beginning

When the calendar flips to November, we all get into a normal rhythm for this time of year. Once Halloween decorations are put away, we know that only moments later we reach the "holidays" which include so much.

We anticipate that the fourth Thursday in November is the American holiday of Thanksgiving followed quickly by "Black Friday" and the secular count-down to Christmas. Secularly, some might refer to that as "Good Friday" for all the sales that pop up everywhere with the day of Christmas as the final celebration of familial gift-giving.

But all of that secular "fat" has been slowly stacked upon the liturgical "bones" of the Church. The weekends before and after that start of Thanksgiving have a significance that far out-strips the commercialization that has only grown since Charlie Brown first pointed it out some 57 years ago.

The weekend before Thanksgiving is the time for some celebratory endings. November 20<sup>th</sup> is Christ the King Sunday and the ending of the liturgical year (not to mention the day before is when I turn 60 and end my time as a youth!). Christ the King not only ends our annual cycle of lessons on Sundays, but looks forward to the end of this old heaven and earth, giving way to Christ's reign in the New Heaven and New Earth where all our sorrows will cease! It is an ending to be sure, but it is usually overwhelmed by the new beginning that comes on its heels.

You see, November 26<sup>th</sup> is what is often referred to as "low Sunday" because it falls on the weekend of Thanksgiving. It traditionally has the lowest attendance of all, but it really is the new beginning many look forward to each and every year. It is the START of a new liturgical year and the first Sunday in Advent. There is little lament for the previous year as every attention is turned to the wonder of a new Christmas to celebrate our God, Emmanuel, the God coming into the world to be with us! Don't get me wrong, the presents help, but new and good beginnings are a much more powerful force pulling us forward with the gravity of new possibilities, rather than drawing us back to remain in the same old year we've already lived through.

November is about endings. The regular season that gives way to holidays. End of the world focus on the whole Universe that gives way to the microcosm cradled in a manger. Thanksgiving reflections that look at what families can be thankful for during last year, but so much conversation about what comes next!

My guess is that November will also present the looming reality of the ending of my time here in Petersburg. No details are in place now, but as many of us have realized, my time and my ministry are coming to a close. They come to a close not on a sad note, but on the triumphant realization that the goals that brought me here have been accomplished. And so soon, the new beginnings will come into focus.

The call committee is poised to discern the new settled pastor who will come and benefit from all we have accomplished this past year. What we have worked to set in place will be a given for that person who will appreciate the results and have a firm place upon which to build ministry. What a great new beginning awaits!

As for me, I suspect that God will show me where to go next during these coming days. And I will be able to leave here with great experiences, great learning, and great friendships that will not see an ending. I expect we will be able to cherish the memories that we have shared, but realize that God is not done with any of us nor the ministry that will continue beyond this time.

Dealing with an ending and a beginning at the same time: that sounds like the very definition of transition that I started my time with you trying to explain. A letting-go of what was, while at the same time grasping onto the future that God has in mind. What better time to think of such things than when we look to Christ's ultimate victory over sin, death, and the grave; when we look to God being with us in something as simple as a baby born into the world; and when we can gather with Thanksgiving for the time that God has brought us together, and the wondrous things he has done through us as well as the wonders yet to come!

Though it seems a bit premature: Happy Holidays; Happy Holy Days, and a Great Thanksgiving all this coming month!
